MUTTON BIRD RESCUE

On Tuesday 15 October Jaxen Stewart, Corbin Turrell and Hughie Reynolds went down to the beach to check the surf to see if it was good. They saw a bird on the sand and

patted it, and then saw Bruce who was rescuing birds from the water. Hughie went down to the water and offered to help rescue the fatigued birds. He called out to Jaxen and Corbin to come and help rescue the birds. They ran up and down the beach



four or more times with a bird in each hand every time. Corbin and Hughie were wrapping the birds in towels so they kept warm and calmed down. When they put the first lot into Bruce's car they only had about 32 birds. They then drove to the next track further up the beach to start collecting more birds which were down towards North Blackrocks beach. Forty more birds were put into Bruce's Range Rover and the ones that wouldn't fit in the car were put up past the water line on the sand dunes so they could rest. They took the birds back to Bruce's house and put them in his garage to rest up. In all they saved about 70 birds plus the 40 rescued and left to recover on the sand dunes. They were rescuing the birds from about 4.30pm until 7.15pm!


RED CROSS BLOOD DONOR MOBILE

EXAM STRESS – HOW TO HELP YOUR CHILD

If your teenager experiences exam stress, one of the best things you can do as a parent or carer is to try to be as supportive and tolerant as possible. Reassure them that there are more important things in life and that this is only part of the story. Let your child know you will help them no matter what and, although naturally you want them to do well, you will not think any less of them if these particular exams don't work out.

Study and learning habits

Helping your child to establish effective study and learning habits can help to reduce stress.

- Is there an uncluttered table where they can work? Help them to find somewhere which is likely to be undisturbed.
- Encourage your child to find out exactly what the test involves are there past test papers they can look at to help them understand what to expect?

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- Encourage your child to ask for help or ask their teacher • for clarity if they are unsure of something or if they feel confused.
- Help them to make 'mind maps' to collect ideas and summarise thoughts - use bright colours to help remember important links.
- Help them to plan their study schedule early on so that they have sufficient time to study. It can be helpful to develop a clear, realistic plan of what they want to cover in each study session. Can they break it down into small chunks?
- Remind your child to take a short rest and move around in between each part of their study.
- Offer help sometimes. It can be useful having someone to listen or practise with.

Practical ideas to help your child cope with exam stress

- Encourage your child to stick to a routine of going to bed • at a reasonable time, eating regularly and making time to have fun and exercise.
- Help them to cut back on coffee or any other stimulants • they may be using, as these can increase agitation. Encourage them to drink lots of water instead.
- Encourage them to take time out when they eat, rather than carrying on with study. Encourage them to eat fresh fruit, veggies, cereals, grains, nuts and protein they are all good for the brain and blood sugar levels.
- Encourage them to eat when they get hungry. This keeps blood sugar and hydration levels steady. Avoid junk food if possible because it will bring a sudden sugar high and then fall away quickly leaving a person feeling tired.
- Try not to nag as they may be feeling a lot of pressure already. It helps to stay calm and offer support perhaps offer a cup of tea occasionally or record their favourite TV program to watch later.

Ideas for exam day

- Talk about these ideas before exam day so as not to . add to anxiety levels.
- Suggest to your child that they:
- organise and pack everything that they need to take with them into the exam, the night before
- keep away from people who may agitate them before the test or may say unhelpful, anxiety-provoking comments
- take time to slow their breathing and relax when they first sit down
- read through the paper, underlining key words and instructions. Work out how long they have for each question or section
- watch out for the wording of the questions make sure that they understand and address what the question is really asking

- answer the questions they find easiest first, then as • they relax more move onto the other ones (by then their mind has relaxed and they are likely to find the work easier)
- re-read answers if possible and make any changes that are necessary - cross out notes, correct spelling, check workings

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Dear Parent or Carer

The Essential Secondary Science Assessment (ESSA) test for Year 8 students will be held between **Monday 11 November** and **Friday 15 November 2013**. The test takes approximately **80 minutes**. The test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer. It is called ESSAonline.

HIGH SCHOOL

ESSAonline contains multiple choice, short response and extended response tasks that are grouped around real-world issues, including scientific investigations. This is a diagnostic test, with tasks framed on Stage 4 outcomes and essential content in the NSW Science Years 7–10 Syllabus. Students will be tested on their:

knowledge and understanding of science

- understanding and skills in the process of scientific investigation
- ability to evaluate evidence, make judgements and think critically
- ability to access information and communicate scientific ideas.

Students also complete a survey about their opinions, attitudes and values. Since students complete ESSAonline on a computer, each student needs to bring **headphones or earbuds** that plug into a school computer. Earbuds for an ipod or portable player are suitable.

If your child has a disability that needs special consideration or has been educated in English for less than one year, please contact your child's school to discuss special provisions or possible exemption from the test.

Results of the test will be available during Term 1 2014. Information about each student is treated confidentially and held securely to ensure that the right to privacy of all students is maintained. A personal report for each student will be sent to parents/carers to describe the science knowledge and skills demonstrated by the student in the test. There will also be information about how your child's results compare with overall performance of all students in the test. You will be invited to complete a parent survey about the test and science learning.

The principal of your child's school is able to provide you with more details about the ESSA program if you require additional information.

> Young Drivers aged 17-25 years. Why are they at risk?

Facts:

- 1. Road crashes are one of the leading causes of injury, disability and death among young people.
- Young drivers are over-represented in road crashes compared to other age groups especially young males.
- 3. Drivers in rural areas experience a higher rate of fatalities than those from urban areas.
- Speeding is the major cause of road crashes in NSW and crashes which involve speeding are more likely to result in fatal crashes.
- 5. Other high-risk behaviours that significantly contribute to road crashes and injuries include:
 - Drink driving
 - Driver fatigue and distraction
 - Not using seat belts

Driver inexperience: Often young drivers don't realise that it takes time and lots of practice to develop safe driving skills.

Developing brain: Parts of the brain responsible for selfcontrol and for recognising and managing hazards do not fully mature until after the teenage years, so young drivers are more likely to experiment and take dangerous risks.

Overconfidence and risk taking: Young drivers can be over confident about their driving ability and underestimate dangers on the road.

Having friends as passengers: Young drivers may be distracted by passengers or may feel pressured to take risks, such as speeding. Every extra peer passenger carried by a young driver increases the chance of crashing.

Alcohol and other drugs: Young people often do not understand that alcohol and other drugs affect a driver's skills, mood and most importantly behaviour. Safe driving requires clear judgement, concentration and ability to react to what's happening on the road.

Busy lifestyles: Work, sport and study often mean busy lifestyles for young people, which may cause them to drive when tired – especially late at night. Driving tired significantly impairs driving, even if the driver doesn't feel sleepy.
