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Principal's Column

Parent, Student and Staff Forums

The Kingscliff High School process of community consultation, a fundamental precursor to the work our staff, along with parent and student representatives, will be undertaking in devising our School Improvement Plan 2015–17, is now well under

My thanks are also extended to all students, parents and staff who participated in these forums.

From this point, I will be working with our highly experienced Deputies, Mr Cowell and Mr Opfer (relieving for Mrs Ludeke), to use the key themes raised in these forums to construct surveys open to the entire student, parent and staff bodies via survey monkey. Our intention is to gain as complete a picture as possible of the views of our entire school community. This input, along with our analysis of other forms of data ranging from student attendance, exam results and records of behaviour management, will form a comprehensive package of data which will inform the strategic directions in ours School Improvement Plan.

I look forward to continuing to work with all sections of our school community in this extremely significant process.

Partner Primary School Visits

Over the past two weeks it has been my great pleasure to have visited all of our partner primary schools and to have met Mr Channels at Cudgen PS, Mr Houlahan at Kingscliff PS, Mrs McKinnon at Pottsville PS, Mrs Marshall at Fingal Head PS, Mr Pritchard at Duranbah PS and Mrs Lalor at Bogangar PS. I have also attended staff meetings at Kingscliff and Pottsville, and look forward to similar ongoing visits to the other schools.

Kingscliff High School is certainly extremely lucky to be a part of the above Coastal Learning Community, with its strong emphasis on a continuum of learning from Kindergarten to Year 12, with a particular emphasis on Years 6 into 7 transitions. I look forward to continuing to work with these fantastic schools and consolidating our already strong partnership.

When time permits, I intend visiting the local shopping centres at Bogangar and Pottsville, having already done so at Kingscliff. Not only do such visits provide an opportunity to become more familiar with the community from which our students are drawn, it is also a great excuse to spend time in an area that would have to be the envy of the rest of NSW!

On Friday it was my great pleasure to attend my first formal academic assembly at Kingscliff High School, in this case celebrating the success of Year 11 students who completed their Preliminary Course subjects, in preparation for the HSC, at the end of last term. I would like to commend all award recipients on the effort and commitment to study required to receive such recognition. In particular, my congratulations are extended to students who were recognised as the top twelve academic performers during the Preliminary Course. I look forward to hearing more of the achievements of all students in the 2015 HSC cohort over the coming year.

Positive Relationships

All of these extremely positive experiences over the past two weeks have prompted me to again reflect on the vital nature of positive relationships between students and their teachers, and between students themselves, if all members of our learning community are to achieve the degree of success they are both entitled to and capable of when they come to school each and every day.

I know that the vast majority of our students and their families place great value in both education and positive and respectful relationships. For an extremely small minority of students at Kingscliff High School, unfortunately, this does not always appear to be the case. It is my firm view that Kingscliff High School will not be a place where offensive language will be tolerated. I know that this is a view shared not only by all parents and staff with whom I have spoken at Kingscliff High School, but also by the communities of all of the primary schools from which our students come.

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To be very clear then, any offensive language directed towards staff by students, or used by students while speaking to staff, will result in immediate suspension from school. Any offensive language directed by students to other students will also be severely dealt with in line with the Department's stance on harassment and aggressive behaviour.

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It is, nonetheless, my sincere hope that all students will attend school every day with a clear focus on both learning and positive relationships. This will certainly be my intention as I begin another great week at Kingscliff High School.

Year 7 and 8 Yearly Examinations

Year 7 and 8 begin their Yearly Examinations on Monday 10th November. These are very important assessment tasks and in almost all cases contribute significantly to overall marks and position in grade.

Students will receive exam timetables as well as exam rules, however, please find below information that may clear up some questions:

- Students must attend all classes when not in an exam.
- If a student cannot attend an exam for whatever reason they should see Miss Rowles (Year 8), or Mr Mackenzie (Year 7) before the exam in question. If a student finds they are unable to attend an exam because of sickness or family emergency they should call the school immediately and bring a Dr Certificate or equivalent as soon as they return.
- Students must bring their own necessary equipment for the exam (ie pen and a spare, pencil, eraser, ruler to all exams and a calculator to Maths and Science)
- It is worth noting that if a student is caught with a mobile phone in an exam (whether it is on or not) they will receive zero for that exam.

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Year 8 ESSA test

The Essential Secondary Science Assessment (ESSA) test for Year 8 students will be held on Tuesday 11 November. The test takes approximately 80 minutes. The test is an interactive, multimedia test completed entirely on a computer. It is called ESSA online.

Permission to Publish and Online Services

The School/Department of Education and Communities may publish information about your child for the purpose of sharing his/her experiences with other students, informing the school and broader community about school and student activities and recording student participation in noteworthy projects or community services.

The Department of Education and Communities also provides students with access to the Internet, a customised Gmail account and online applications such as Google Apps. These resources enable students to collaborate with peers, publish online and create personalised research portals.

In Term 1 2015 every student will be sent home a permission to publish consent form.



On Thursday 6 November eight Year 11 students went to Tweed City to donate blood at the Red Cross Donormobile. The donations go towards the Kingscliff High School Club Red Program. 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Talking to Young People about Alcohol and Drugs

It is best for education about alcohol and drugs to begin before young people are exposed to personal decisions about their use. Young people who have accurate information, coping and decision making skills and understand the issues, will be in a good position to make responsible decisions about alcohol and drugs.

Parents provide a powerful role model when it comes to drinking and attitudes to alcohol and other drugs. Take time to talk. Sitting down with the young person in your care and mapping out a plan of action and what to say if they are offered drugs or alcohol can help equip them for the almost inevitable real event. Listen to what the young person in your family says about alcohol and drugs and follow up with a discussion. Take the opportunities when they come up during everyday activities, for example:

When you pour a glass of alcohol When alcohol or other drugs are mentioned on TV or other media When using or giving out medicines When your young person has an assignment on alcohol, smoking, medicines or other drugs.

It is important to understand that in some situations young people may take risks. Sitting down afterwards and helping them identify where things started to go wrong enables them to consider what they could do differently the next time they are faced with a similar situation.

Australian Alcohol Guideline for Children and young people under 18

Not drinking alcohol is the safest option.

For children under 15

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Parents and carers are advised that children under 15 years of age are at the greatest risk of harm from drinking and that for this age group, not drinking is especially important.

For Young people aged 15-18 years

The safest option is to delay the initiation of drinking for as long as possible. *Australian Alcohol Guidelines to reduce health risks from drinking alcohol*. The Safer Drivers Course involves two modules:

Module one: A three-hour facilitated group discussion on how to manage risks on the road. This will involve a maximum of twelve participants and will be delivered by a facilitator.

Module two: A two-hour in-vehicle coaching session to develop low-risk driving strategies. This will involve two participants and a coach. Course cost: \$140

Participants must have completed 50 hours of actual on-road driving experience to be eligible for the course. Credits gained under the 3 for 1 scheme cannot be included.

Participants who complete the course will receive 20 hours credit recorded in their learner driver log book.

IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM NSW POLICE TO PARENTS AND STUDENTS OF KINGSCLIFF HIGH SCHOOL

Over the past 12 months, Tweed Byron Local Area Command have identified a number of issues with underage parties and social gatherings of young people around the bushland and beaches within the Kingscliff, Cabarita areas on weekend and during holiday periods.

- Police have identified issues relating to drugs, alcohol, underage sex, violence, offensive behaviour and malicious damage, including to police vehicles responding to these unsupervised social events.
- Police have identified children as young as 12 intoxicated and have returned them home to parents who have little idea that their child was attending this type of gathering. Parents believing that their child was at a 'friend's house'.
- Police wish to warn all parents that these gatherings are NOT safe and appropriate events for young people to attend. Police encourage parents to ensure that they are completely aware of their children's whereabouts and do not simply take the word of their child.
- Police will be targeting and patrolling these areas during the warmer months and will implement a zero tolerance to anti social behaviour. This will include searching and disposing of alcohol and taking appropriate action against any person supplying alcohol to minors.
- Police working together with Kingscliff High School wish to educate all parents and students as to the possible dangers and consequences of attending these types of unsupervised events. Often, those organising these events are older people and are NOT associated with local schools. The concern is that young students/people are attending these events and placing themselves in dangerous situations.
