Welcome to and Acknowledgement of Country Learning

Kingscliff High School teachers were grateful to be part of Professional Learning about the significance of Welcome to and Acknowledgement of Country on Thursday March 10. The professional learning gave teachers a deeper understanding of the importance of Country to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people and was delivered by Aboriginal Learning and Wellbeing Officer, Belinda Standage; Relieving Aboriginal Community Liaison Officer, Thomas Avery; Aboriginal Learning and Wellbeing Advisor, Debbie Elliott; and Aboriginal Community Liaison Officer, Andrea Laurie. Now all teachers must put what they learnt into action to create their personal Acknowledgement of Country. The Acknowledgement of Country must be created for a school event or a special occasion. Teachers can create a class acknowledgment, a faculty acknowledgment, a whole school acknowledgement, or do a student workshop.

Best Start Year 7 Assessment

Year 7 students will participate in the Best Start Year 7 Assessment in Week 4 Term 1, 2022. Best Start Year 7 is an online literacy and numeracy assessment available to secondary schools that assesses key literacy and numeracy skills of Year 7 students. It is designed to assist teachers to identify students who may require additional support in developing their literacy and numeracy skills. The purpose of the Best Start Year 7 assessment is to provide feedback to teachers to help identify student needs. Best Start Year 7 is just one of a range of assessments the school uses to assess students. Students have been asked to bring headphones or earbuds that connect to their BYOD iPad to enable them to hear audio during the assessment. NSW SCHOOL VACCINATION PROGRAM

Each year NSW Health works in partnership with schools to offer the vaccines recommended by the National Health and Medical Research Council (NHMRC) for adolescents as part of the school vaccination program.

In 2022 the following vaccines will be offered on: **Thursday 31st March & Friday 1st April 2022**Please note this is a change of date due to the impact of the floods in Lismore on the NSW School Vaccination Program Unit.

YEARS VACCINE NUMBER OF DOSES

- Year 7 Human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine 2-doses at least 6 months apart Diphtheria-Tetanus-Pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine Single dose
- Years 10 Meningococcal ACWY vaccine single dose

Parent Information Kits that include an information sheet, consent form and privacy statement will be sent home to parents/guardians next week.

To consent to the vaccination of their child, parents/guardians are advised to:

- read all the information provided
- · complete the consent form, including signing their name next to the vaccine/s they would like their child to receive
- return the completed consent form to their child's school
- ensure their child eats breakfast on the day of the school vaccination clinic.

Please note that, to improve vaccination completion, students will be opportunistically offered any missed doses during Year 7 and catch up into Year 8 (for HPV and dTpa vaccination) and during Year 10 and catch up into Year 11 (for Meningococcal ACWY vaccination) or consent signed in 2021.

Parents/guardians who wish to withdraw their consent for any reason may do so by writing to the school Principal or phoning the school. The Procedure for Withdrawal of Consent is available on the NSW Health website at www.health.nsw.gov.au/immunisation/ Pages/withdraw_consent.aspx.

A Record of Vaccination will be provided to each student vaccinated at each clinic either as a physical card or a text message sent to the mobile number recorded on the consent form. Details about vaccinations given at school will also be uploaded to the Australian Immunisation Register (AIR) to support complete vaccination histories.

Approximately 1 in 5 young people experiences significant anxiety and fearfulness that affects their daily life. The NSW Department of Education has engaged the Centre for Emotional Health at Macquarie University to offer <u>free access</u> to online treatments for school students who have significant anxiety disorders.

WHAT IS ANXIETY?

There are a range of different types of anxiety experienced by children and teenagers including finding it difficult to be away from parents, being extremely shy, worrying about what others think of them, avoiding social and school activities, or worrying a lot about everyday matters, potential dangers and the future. Sleep difficulties, headaches, nausea and difficulty breathing can be part of these feelings. Many children experience more than one type of anxiety.





BENEFITS OF COOL KIDS ONLINE

- Families can access Cool Kids Online in the comfort of their own homes
- The interactive online format is easy to navigate and engaging for children and young people
- Families receive professional telephone support throughout the program from qualified, experienced therapists
- Cool Kids Online is based on research and has been shown to be effective in reducing anxiety.





WHAT DO THE ONLINE PROGRAMS INVOLVE?

There are 8 modules that contain text, videos, exercises, and illustrations – to teach the youth (and parent) clear and practical skills to help the young person manage their fears and worries and overcome their anxieties. The modules will cover:

- a. Learning about feelings and anxiety
- b. Fighting fear by facing fear
- Detective thinking, and learning to think more realistically
- Building assertiveness and dealing with teasing
- e. Helpful ways of coping when upset

Families also receive four, 30 minutetelephone sessions with an experienced therapist during the program. These sessions enable parents or youth to ask questions about program content and help them apply the skills to their fears and worries.

For children in primary school, the program is mostly delivered to their primary caregiver, who then uses it to help their child. For adolescents in high school, the program is directly delivered to the teenager, with some additional support from their caregiver

WHAT DO WE NEED TO DO?

- Eligible families who are referred by their school counselling team contact Cool Kids team at 02/9850-6393 or CKOschools@mq.edu.au
- You will be supplied with a link to register your interest in the program
- Once you have completed the registration form, you will be emailed a link to a website. At that linked website you will find a series of detailed questions for both the caregiver and the young person to complete. This is an important assessment that tells us whether the program is suitable for your child.
- If the program is suitable, you will receive a brief call from your allocated therapist who will want to say hello
- Then, you will be contacted by an intake officer who will schedule your four telephone sessions and provide you with a personal login.
- You and your child will work through the program with support from your therapist over the next 12 weeks.
- At the end of 12 weeks, you will once again be asked to complete the online assessment so that we can see how much your child has improved.

ABOUT US

The Centre for Emotional Health (CEH) is an internationally recognised specialist research centre at Macquarie University in Sydney, Australia. The CEH conducts research to further our understanding of child and adult emotional disorders and to improve methods of assessment and treatment.

The Cool Kids Programs have been developed and evaluated at the CEH over the past 25 years. Cool Kids is a structured, skills-based program that teaches children and their parents how to better manage anxiety. Many scientific studies show that most young people who complete Cool Kids experience significant improvements, with decreases in worry, fear, family distress and life interference.

Tweed Valley Hospital Project

Site activity update - Monday 14 to Friday 25 March 2022

Recent extreme weather

We hope you and your family remained safe during the recent extreme weather event. Lendlease closed the Tweed Valley Hospital site from Monday 28 February to Friday 4 March with works commencing at full capacity from Monday 7 March 2022.

Construction activities

The following activities will take place over the next two weeks, weather permitting:

Works for the main hospital buildings:

- Concrete pours on Levels 5 and 6 with approximately four slabs scheduled to be poured in the coming fortnight.
- Steel fixing continues on Level 6 in preparation for slab pours.
- Concrete pours for the Eastern and Western central cores on Levels 7 and 8.
- Concreting for the 10 internal stair cores is ongoing including forming and pouring the stair flights and landings.
- Preparations for second large concrete pour for the bunker roof. This will require a 4.30am start due to the size of the pour. The pour is currently scheduled to occur prior to 31 March, weather pending.
- Removal of formwork on Level 4.
- Continued delivery and installation of precast façade panels and mega façade panels
- Fit-out activities on Basement, Lower Ground, Ground and Level 1 continue, specifically walls, partitions, ceilings, painting and services.
- Ongoing work for the switching (power) station on the western side of site.

Works external to site:

• Works for the permanent power installation on Cudgen Road is nearing completion. The team will work with Essential Energy to finalise the connection into the existing network with the work site on Cudgen Road to be demobbed over the coming weeks.

What to expect during construction?

- Trucks delivering concrete and materials to site.
- Construction vehicles entering and exiting site.
- Standard construction hours are Mon-Fri 6am-6pm, and Sat 6am-6pm.
- Some noise, dust or vibrations may occur from these activities. Monitoring controls are in place to maintain levels within permissible limits.
