School Captains of 2024


A huge congratulations to our new 2024 school captains. These students have been given the opportunity to lead our school all through Term 4 this year and next year.




SPORT NEWS

Seen these ants in the Tweed?



Red imported fire ants

Solenopsis invicta

How could fire ants affect you?

- they swarm aggressively, stinging over and over, causing a severe burning feeling and allergic reactions
- they restrict use of backyards, parks, playgrounds, and beaches, and sting pets and livestock
- they kill off native plants and animals and damage ecosystems beyond repair

Fire ants are getting closer

- they could be moved into NSW from Southeast Queensland in hay, potted plants, soil, sand, mulch, turf and on agricultural machinery
- they could spread from nests close to the border

Look for nests that are:

- flattish patches of soil or mounds up to 40 cm high, with no obvious entrance holes
- loose or crumbly looking, with a honeycomb appearance inside

Look for ants that are:

- dark reddish-brown with a darker brown-black abdomen
- different sizes in the one nest (between 2 and 6 mm long)
- aggressive, swarming out of the nest if gently poked with a stick

Check:

- sunny, open areas of lawn or pasture, areas of disturbed soil
- gardens, backyards, parks, roadsides, paddocks, fence lines, cropped land
- where hay, turf, mulch, soil, potted plants, sand, gravel or agricultural machinery has been used or stored, especially if it came from southeast Queensland

If you see nests or ants like this or you've been stung multiple times and the stings form white pustules, call us.

CONSEQUENCES FOR BREACHING EXAM RULES:

- 1. General warning is the final warning
- 2. First personal warning will result in the loss of 20% of exam marks and will be noted on the exam paper (unless the infraction was cheating or using a mobile phone in which case a zero mark for that exam will be recorded)
- 3. Second personal warning will result in receiving a zero mark for that exam and will be noted on the exam paper

APPEALS:

Any student wishing to appeal a sanction imposed for breaching exam rules must do so in writing to the Principal within five (5) school days. Appeal Forms are available from the Deputy Principal.

ILLNESS AND MISADVENTURE:

Students unable to attend exam/s due to illness or misadventure should:

- 1. Inform the school as soon as possible, preferably prior to the exam
- 2. Collect and complete an 'Illness and/or Misadventure' form available from the Deputy Principal
- 3. Complete the form and return to the Principal within two school days along with documentary evidence (such as a Medical Certificate)

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
